John O. Calicchio, 68, longtime resident of Stamford, peacefully passed at his home in Stamford on Friday, June 20, 2014. He was born July 5, 1945 in Kensington, CT to the late Andrew and Flora (Misteri) Calicchio.

John grew up in Kensington with his brother and sisters and attended St. Paul's Catholic School in Berlin, CT. In 1961 he moved to Stamford and graduated from Stamford High School with the class of 1964.
